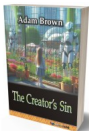
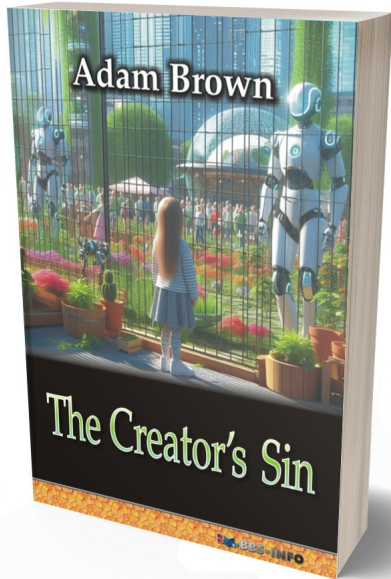

But when she confronts why and how all this happened, she must realize: the machines only did what humans taught them. But could the genie ever have been put back in the bottle, if human flaws hadn't let every opportunity for restraint slip away?
